The Employment First Philosophy

 "Employment First, (is) a framework for systems change that is centered on the premise that all citizens, including individuals with significant disabilities, are capable of full participation in integrated employment and community life."

US Department of Labor

Serving Youth...

- There are approximately 25 DVR Counselors who serve transition age youth
- More than one-third of the individuals DVR serves are transition age youth
- Every high school has an assigned DVR Counselor
- DVR clients do not experience any disruption in services at age 18

Referring Students to VR

- Students may be referred by parents, teachers, case managers, guidance counselors – or they may refer themselves!
- VR recommends that students apply for services two years before high school graduation but may register for Pre-Employment Transition Services at age 14 (9th grade).

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)

- Increases collaboration
- Promotes competitive, integrated
 employment in community-based settings
- Requires that Maine DVR set aside 15% of its funds to provide Pre Employment Transition Services (or "Pre-ETS") to high school students with disabilities.

Doesn't replace the requirements of schools and MDOE under IDEA

What are Pre-ETS?

- Job Exploration Counseling
- Work-based Learning Experiences
- Counseling on Opportunities for Post-Secondary Training and Education
- 4. Workplace Readiness Training to Develop Social Skills and Independent Living
- Instruction in Self-Advocacy

Who is eligible for Pre-ETS?

Must be a "student with a disability" between the ages of 14-21 and enrolled in a secondary or postsecondary educational program

May be a current VR client or may be "Potentially Eligible"

Registering for Pre-Employment Transition Services

- Do not need to become a VR client
- Student/Parent completes and signs a one-page form
- VR provides Pre-Employment Transition Services (in collaboration with the school) until the student no longer needs them, reaches age 21, or needs to apply for VR to receive more individualized transition services.

- In group settings and
 - In partnership with schools
 - In partnership with community organizations
 - In partnership with community rehabilitation providers (CRPs)
 - In partnership with employers
 - In partnership with other state agencies

Pre-ETS – Examples that can be done with Potentially Eligible Students

- A VRC pairs with a high school teacher to introduce the O*Net
- VR works with a local employer to set up a time for area high school students to visit
- A VRC joins a life skills classroom to conduct an activity from the Bridge Career Exploration Workshop for a small group of students
- VR works with school partners to arrange for a representative of the community college's disability services office to come speak with students
- A VRC delivers modules from the Transition Career Exploration Workshop as part of a high school "job club"

Summer Work Experience - 2017

- VR supported
 - Approximately 200 students around the state
 - Paid at minimum wage
 - Employment in the community
 - Some school programs, some individual placements
 - Built-in employability class
 - Great feedback

Youth Career Exploration Days

- Held in October as part of National Disability Employment Awareness Month
- Employers include: Bates College, Courtyard Marriott Hotel, Sterling Rope, TD Bank, Volk Packaging, Strainrite
- Sending schools Biddeford Alternative
 Pathways, Lake Region Vocational Center, Lisbon
 High School, Old Orchard Beach High School and
 RFTC

UMA - Summer Transition Workshop

- Week-long workshop held at the University of Maine at Augusta.
- Activities included: campus tour, presentation on how to disclose a disability and request accommodations, fun speakers, introduction to ASL...
- Students identified their Strengths, Needs, Opportunities and Worries in a SNOW Chart.
- Job Shadows included: The Senator Inn & Spa, Kennebec Valley YMCA and Maine General Hospital.
- Tours included the Augusta CareerCenter and the State House.

JMG Partnership

- Across much of the state, JMG will be working closely with VR by providing information on VR and Pre-ETS to students and their families – and assisting them to register for Pre-ETS services!
- JMG is also partnering with DVR in the Transition Work Based Model Demonstration Grant

Progressive Employment

- "Everyone is ready for something"
 - Early engagement
 - Informational interviews, job shadows, paid work experience
 - Different way of partnering with the business community

- Continuing for transition-age youth in Portland and Lewiston
- Over 400 Progressive Employment activities to date!
- Expansion to Bangor and Augusta under TWBL grant

Outreach to Families

- Activities such as:
 - Maine Parent Federation Transition Fairs
 - "Parent Nights"
 - Participation in IEP meetings
 - Presentations

Job Club

- Spruce Mtn HS & Leavitt Area HS
- Partnership with UMF Rehabilitation Students
- Fun career preparation activities and planning for post-secondary education

TCEW is:

- A curriculum designed to help students discover employment possibilities in an interactive team environment.
- Offered in modules that make it flexible for delivery in schools, adult ed, community organizations or other settings
- Includes numerous assessments that can support transition planning
- Available for use independently or in conjunction with VR

Transition Work-Based Learning Model Demonstration Grant

- Partnership with Jobs for Maine's Grads
- 5-year initiative to implement and evaluate "Enhanced JMG" and "Progressive Employment" interventions with students in the Augusta and Bangor regions
- Goal of improving post-secondary education and employment outcomes

Discovering Personal Genius

- Career Planning approach to identify an individual's interests and skills
- Development of three vocational themes
- Identify conditions for employment success

- Opportunities for more use with youth in transition
 - Transition assessment
 - Preparation for referral to VR

VR-School Collaborations

- Working together to develop employer tours, mock interviews, work-based learning, career assessments at school and in the community
- Building off summer work experiences!
